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...from the Chair

Greetings from the Chair - of the Conservation Committee, that is. Summer is upon us and many of us will be scattering to various parts of the earth, enjoying the out-of-doors. As you pass through beautiful places, try asking yourself how it happens that they are still beautiful. Has it been by chance, or in the past have people taken some sort of action to preserve the beauty? Do you find that the answer depends somewhat on the amount of “development pressure” in an area?

For an example I look at the rolling hills that rise on either side of I-88, still mostly unbroken forest above farm fields—a lovely sight, in my opinion. Until recently, there has been little pressure or desire to build structures on these slopes. Chance has favored us, so far. If you drive through the Pocono Mountains you will likely notice that the situation is far different there: development has reached the tops of the mountains. What will the future bring to our hills, I wonder? Is it time to think about “smart growth” and who will be in charge of that?

The journal *Riverkeeper* comments that “throughout New York State, untouched landscapes are becoming an endangered species of sorts...as sprawl development is occurring at an alarming rate.” But at a recent meeting of the ADK Conservation Committee, Neil Woodworth reported that an effort is underway to give local communities “tools to help preserve their remaining undeveloped land.” Called the “Community Preservation Act,” this newly proposed legislation would allow a community to raise funds for protecting undeveloped lands and resources. Details have been reported in *The Daily Star*. Contact your New York State Senator or Assembly Member and ask him or her to support this plan.

The ADK Advocacy Office remains very active in the effort to preserve undeveloped land. There are various ways that this can be accomplished. The state can purchase these lands outright and then open them to the public, or it can acquire the right for the public to cross these lands in order to access other state land for recreational purposes. ADK works with the state government on these issues for the benefit of our members and the public.

So, while you enjoy your summer time in the out-of-doors, remember two things: most recreational lands are available due to the efforts of conservation-minded folks; and through your membership in ADK you are making a contribution to this effort!
